

Eating Seafood in Germany IS Fun

Who says they don't know what seafood is around Germany? Those who say so haven't hit the right places!

What I'm going to say will leave some of you seaside or gulf coast neighbors a little dry—but what the heck, when in Rome do as the Germans do!

Some fine seafood appetizers, or Vorspeise, hardly resembles the French listing of hors d'oeuvres or a Scandinavian smorgasbord menu with a multiple listing of savory morsels cooked to a personal recipe. Only one single item is chosen individually from the German menu. I must add, seafood items are more tasteful as you move nearer the ocean, as Hamburg, for instance. Maybe just being near the water has something to do with it.

Smoked fish (and these are delicious!), pickled fish and fish in aspic jelly are termed as important appetizers in Germany. I guess you can order them raw, also, because I most uncomfortably watched a guy eat one with globs of pepper sauce and splashed down the guzzle with beer. I suppose he camouflaged it to cover up the taste of raw fish.

And, you could go one fish scale higher and sink your teeth into a salmon. After a few bites of the salmon you can tell where the fish last swam because the taste varies according to the river it last called home. The Rhine and Moselle river salmon are considered the most delicate.

I have tried to connect this with the wine values but the Germans swear they don't throw the grape pulp in the river. This explains the case of the drunken milk cow who produced 12% alcohol content—the wine pulp is processed into a maische (for brandy or cognac) and the pulp is then mixed with corn, wheat, potatoes, etc and fed to livestock.

Back to the seafood—we reach a climax. The most elite of all seafood appetizers in Germany is the slimy old cel. Don't knock it because I ate a chunk of it and it was, surprisingly, good. Down in Tennessee we used to cut 'em up in little chunks and fish for big cats on the Little Tennessee River. If I had known what I was feeding those lazy cats, I would have used chicken guts and cooked the eels.

Don't look too lengthy on the menu for shrimps—they're pretty tough for the Germans to dig up. But you can find delicious crayfish and fresh crab meat in your menu. You'll find the lobster only in classy places and I doubt that you would enjoy it because of the price tag. Of course, you can order Russian caviar, French goose liver paste or imported Japanese snails if you're loaded. (With dough, I mean).

Have you ever dipped a snail in garlic and lemon juice? Brother! We used to use those for catching crappy in Tennessee. No wonder the fish hit them so hard!

Actually for seafood value and variety you can't beat your own Club's facilities. To beat it, you have to go to the water's edge—like Hamburg.

Oh, yes—Moselle and Rhine wine go good with whatever seafood you eat—especially the salmon! (I still believe there's a connection).


FROM THE PRESIDENT ...

HOUSE RULES
